- 2. What are some things B. Wordsworth and the narrator do together? How does the world change for the narrator?
- 3. What does B. Wordsworth tell the narrator on his deathbed? How does the narrator respond to B. Wordsworth's revelation?
- 4. What does B. Wordsworth's initial request suggest about him? How does it set him apart from the others?
- 5. How has the narrator become "like a poet?"
- 6. The author grew up in Trinidad and Tobago, in a poverty stricken environment, which is also the setting for this story. Is this story unique to Trinidad and Tobago, or does it contain universal qualities? How might a different setting change the story?
- 7. Do you think B. Wordsworth has the qualities of a poet? Why?
- 8. Why might the narrator be so accepting of B. Wordsworth? In your opinion, why might children be generally more accepting of people's differences than adults?
